# Garden Committee Report June 2022

### **Weather Report**

Well, it's been a hot one so far. Found a website that said we had 9 100-degree days in 2020, and 8 in 2021. I have the very definite impression we beat both of those in the last week. Most days right now are two jug days.



This year's weather has not been so kind to us this year.

## **Projects**

We only have two garden projects going right now.

<u>Watering</u>: The heat has us paying very close attention to watering. We're in the "keep the plants alive" mode. This is a real challenge with a residential water meter and a 14 ½ acre farm.

<u>Weed Control</u>: Ever heard this before? "Houston, we have a problem." If Shiloh Field has a problem, this has got to be the No. 1. The raised beds aren't too bad. The in-ground ones, yikes. I didn't take a pic to put here because... well... it was too embarrassing.

#### **Virtual Garden Tour**

Onions: The onions are done. We just need to finish getting them out of the ground and delivered.

<u>Potatoes</u>: We are in full harvest mode for the potatoes. Every harvest day we're taking up a few rows and getting them delivered.

<u>Carrots</u>: I'm learning something right now. Fertilizing carrots with Miracle Gro grows great carrot tops. Carrots? Not so much. Apparently, they require a more balanced fertilizer. So, lots of the carrots we're harvesting right now are undersized. Got some 20-20-20 early this week to start fertilizing the baby carrot beds properly.

<u>Tomatoes</u>: The tomatoes got away from us this year. In Tunnel No. 2, it was just one giant mound of tomato vegetation. Wasn't sure there



were even any tomatoes in there. Tim, our tomato guy, had gone on a three-week vacation. When he got back, he got to work. Grabbed a couple of volunteers, and tied them, clipped



them, restrained them and tamed them. Now you can see that tomato plants don't just produce vegetation. They produce tomatoes too!

<u>Peppers</u>: The peppers like this heat, as long as we can keep them watered. Last month I included this first pic. They've



grown since then. Some are starting to produce peppers. Nice!





<u>Nursery</u>: As I mentioned in the board work session, the nursery has a problem brewing. The creek bank behind it is eroding at an increasingly rapid rate. It isn't a problem yet, but it's going to be. We need to start planning on relocating it somewhere else, maybe behind the barn.

<u>Green Beans</u>: Last month I told you we're trying momentum bush beans. They've grown and done well so far. Was meeting with Clyde a couple of weeks ago. He says green beans shed their blooms in high heat. They're just at the budding stage. We'll see if he's right. I can report that they aren't real happy with these 100 degree days.

Blackberries: They're just about done this year. Time to prune, fertilize and get ready for next year.

Yellow and Zucchini Squash: Oh boy. Remember the second project right now? Weeding? This is

where it's needed most. New area of in-ground beds, and a high weed seed bank equals lots of work. Hard work. Been adjusting the irrigation timers here a lot too.

<u>Okra</u>: No longer seedlings. They're growing about 18"-24" tall now, and beginning to put on flowers. Be picking soon. They love this Texas heat. As long as we keep them watered, they'll grow like weeds. We seem to grow them well, so that's a refreshing thought.

<u>Cucumbers</u>: Well, this is the second year we've grown the MiniMe and Manny cucumbers. The greenhouse ones, the ones that produce all female flowers. The



ones that produce those cute smaller cucumbers. These are the ones that require more perfect growing conditions. Once they get stressed at all, they get spider mites. Once they get spider mites, they're done. At least here they are. We've been forced to pull out the MiniMe cukes, and the Mannys are coming out soon. Dang it. Had higher hopes.
