# Garden Committee Report August 2022

# **Initial Comments**

There's news! Rain - finally. At least for a while, the heat has broken. Things are looking up. It's time to think of our fall garden, and it's already being implemented.

And there's more good news... It always helps me to see and remember why we do what it is we do. Here's an example...

#### Projects

<u>Tunnel Irrigation</u>: I told you last month that we were installing one of these irrigation valve complexes at each of the two tunnels. This is done. No more



wondering if the irrigation is on or off. It's only on now when the valve turns on.

<u>Weed Control</u>: Right now we're making a very concentrated effort on weed removal and control. I've got a section of the garden designated to be weeded every day we're open. It's going to take us a while to get it, but we'll make some progress every day.

Irrigation Risers: We've gotten away from this for a



while, now making a return to it. We're replacing the risers in Fields 1 and 2 with something much more durable, workable and permanent.

# Virtual Garden Tour

<u>Potatoes</u>: Dean and I have decided to give a fall crop of potatoes a try. He's done it in the past. He's got some on order, waiting on shipping right now. Got the sock garden all rowed up and waiting. Glad to have gotten this done before the rain set in and we couldn't get the tractor in there for some time.





<u>Tomatoes</u>: We're also giving tomatoes a second chance this fall. Got a bunch planted in Tunnel No. 2, and in Field 1 North. Hopefully they'll do better than the summer ones did.

<u>Peppers</u>: It's amazing what a little rain can do. We got that half inch of rain 10 or so days ago. Within a couple of days, the



peppers perked up, put on new foliage, and started to bloom. Now we have more rain coming... keep on growing, blooming and producing, that's an order!

Yellow and Zucchini Squash: Got some promise here. Michael has a bunch planted and producing in



Field 4, and I've got a bunch more in Field 2 North in the 100' in-ground beds. Here's some pics of the Field 2 plants. I really like the looks of all those yellow squash. One benefit of growing squash in the fall is... the squash bugs aren't nearly as bad, or so I'm told. So far so good, I haven't seen one in the whole bunch.

Cucumbers: This was the pic from last month. What a change a month can make. These are just at the



edge of being harvestable. I'm personally taking care of these. I'm maintaining them as a single stem, as opposed to allowing multi-stems in the past. Testing the theory that, if I control the amount of growth above ground, the roots will be better able to keep up. This way the plant doesn't get so stressed and send out the dinner bell to the bugs. Seems to be working so far. More about ready to be transplanted to back them up.

Eggplant: These are two pics comparing last month's eggplant vs. this month. They're really happy



where they are, and hardly a bug on them. They're producing great big and beautiful fruit. They're planted in Tunnel No. 1. That's where the bitter melon is planted. Last month I reported that the bugs didn't even like the bitter melon. I just wonder if the



scent of the bitter melon is masking the scent of the eggplant and repelling insects. Hmm.

I said they were purdy, can I call it or what? Shout out to the Texas A&M Aggies with an eggplant gig'em.



<u>Bitter Melon</u>: So I told you about bitter melon last month. So far, we've received \$200.00 in cash donations from the places Michael takes it. I'm glad to see they like it. Now they want the leaves to make a tea out of. There's plenty to take 'em. This stuff just grows and grows. We planted one row, now it's taken over the next two.





<u>Green Beans</u>: We've planted a fall round of oriental yard long green beans. They love the heat and will do well until it gets cooler and we plant sugar snap peas. They're in bud and starting to produce beans now. First harvest was yesterday.

<u>Fall Crop Planting</u>: This is a representative pic of the beginning of fall planting. We've planted three types of radish, one turnip bed, one beets, two types of mustard greens, and four beds of lettuce. Two weeks from now, we'll do it again, and a third succession after that.
