Garden Committee Report October 2022

Initial Comments

Long sleeves and a sweat shirt in the mornings, by mid-morning things have warmed up and off come the extra layers. By afternoon the temps are... just lovely. Perfect weather! At least for me. Not so much for the summer garden. It's winding down. But that doesn't mean we're having a bad month. Actually, its been a good month. Lets have a look.

Projects

Irrigation Risers: I'm happy to report this project is finally complete. Working nicely.

<u>Fertigation</u>: This topic starts with squash bugs. They are a real problem in the spring and summer. Michael did some research and found that if you fertilize squash on the plants (miracle gro for example), the bugs are attracted to the nitrogen on the plants – worsening the problem. So, we're installing



fertigation connections to the Field 2 north in-ground bed irrigation. That way we can fertilize through our drip zones.

<u>War Zone</u>: Huh? Yeah, war zone. We've gotten a beachhead established and moving inland. Can you tell what's been retaken from the blackberries and what hasn't? Thank you Elise and Dave! They've done most of the heavy lifting.

Virtual Garden Tour

<u>Potatoes</u>: Last month I'd reported we planted fall potatoes, but they hadn't come up yet and we had high hopes. Well, hopes were dashed. None came up so we went looking for why. We couldn't find a seed potato. Apparently, they rotted in the ground.





<u>Tomatoes</u>: The tomatoes are starting to ripen. In the tours that I've given this month, people seem to be really impressed with the fall crop. There is a lot of tomatoes in both the field and the tunnel. Hope the weather cooperates so we can get most of it harvested before they

freeze. Otherwise, someone's going to be eating a lot of fried green tomatoes.

<u>Peppers</u>: As the weather cools, God's creative design becomes apparent. These peppers seem to know that time is about up, and



they're ripening about as fast as we can pick them (and we pick a lot). These plants were loaded with red fruits just about every time we went out to pick.



<u>Yellow and Zucchini Squash</u>: We've been harvesting squash every harvest day, and boy have they produced (see harvest totals below). But the cooler weather has them slowed way down now. Their time is about up, and they're the next target to make it to the compost pile.

<u>Cucumbers</u>: They're harvested, pulled, and on the compost pile.

Trellis removal and storage is next on the list.

Bitter Melon: The gift that just keeps on giving... and giving... and giving.

<u>Oriental Yard Long Green Beans</u>: Vines stripped, ready for removal and composted.

<u>Carrots</u>: This pic is of the Napoli carrots I'd just planted last month. I've backed them up with nine additional beds of Bolero carrots in





Field 2 beds.

<u>Korean Radish</u>: Took this pic of a Korean radish Michael planted. He says it's a Daikon radish that Kimchi is made of. He and Ellen made some one Saturday and fed us after the harvest. First weekend was mustard greens over rice. Last Saturday was kimchi and/or mustard over rice. Yummy! About 2/3 of this radish is below ground, and the diameter of this handsome specimen is about tennis ball to baseball. Sorry, it's not a good pic, but didn't want to pull it to wind up throwing it away.

<u>Lettuce</u>: What a difference a month can make in the growth of romaine lettuce. Kinda makes me hungry for a salad...



<u>Watermelon</u>: We're harvesting the last of the watermelons. The 34 degree frost the other day settled into Field 3 and 4 and took



the vines out. It's real easy to see the melons to harvest.

<u>Beets</u>: Been on the list to harvest this month. Here's a real nice one.

<u>Cole Crops</u>: The cole crops are coming right along nicely. The



cabbage is just beginning to form heads, the broccoli is too. The cauliflower is, well, cauliflowering.


Volunteer Report

We'll have to see how many germinate. The other picture is of the trays I planted onion seeds in. Five trays each. Maybe we won't have to buy any onion sets in January. That's the goal at least.

I guess this would officially start off the 2023 growing season!
